Indigenous Peoples Day - School Wide Activities

On Friday, June 14th Seycove celebrated National Indigenous Peoples Day. Seycove students had the opportunity to participate in celebrations around the school reflecting on the importance of Indigenous peoples to the fabric of British Columbia and Canada.

In the cafeteria, B.C. First Peoples 11 students hosted the annual BCFP Exhibition, presenting their final inquiry projects to students, community members, and elementary school visitors. Projects were guided by individual inquiries answering the course driving question: What can I do, even if only in a small way, to be a part of Reconciliation?

In the Vortex theatre, guests from our host nations came to share traditional song and stories with the students. Thank you to Robbie George, Laura George and Indigenous student support workers Nick Kofi and Laura Lewis for sharing their time and stories with us.



In the gym, NVSD Indigenous Support Workers, Evan Skye and Dallas Guss, taught learners about lacrosse. Skye and Guss shared about the traditional roots of lacrosse in Indigenous culture, and its significance today. Students were then invited to try out the equipment and participate in a game.



Indigenous Peoples Day Student Art Spotlight



An Opportunity to Heal & Learn By Maya Graham (grade 11)

In 1996 the Governor General proclaimed June 21st as National Indigenous People's Day. Many Indigenous groups and communities have celebrated their cultures on this day, or around this time of year, because of the significance of the summer solstice. As a person of Indigenous descent, from the San Carlos Apache Nation and the Yavapai- Apache Nation, Maya Graham recently had the opportunity to learn more about her heritage and the histories of her people.

This original art painting, "An Opportunity to heal and learn," combines the different aspects of National Indigenous People's Day. June 21st is an opportunity to learn about and celebrate the unique and diverse Indigenous Peoples of Canada. What a lot of Canadians do not realize is that there is not one universal Indigenous belief and culture or style of art. There are many diverse Nations in Canada who all have their own unique culture, and heritage. In Maya's painting, she included culturally significant belongings from multiple Nations across Turtle Island. Today, we also recognize Canada's colonial history and past and ongoing treatment of Indigenous Peoples. This painting includes objects that symbolize the experiences of the first peoples and ongoing issues in Canada. This includes the history of residential schools, generational trauma, and missing and murdered Indigenous women and girls.

Econ 12 - The Way the Cookie Crumbles...

Well, it was a crumby situation in Econ class this week as we simulated wealth inequality by distributing Oreo cookies. Applying the 80/20 rule, a small group (20%) hit the jackpot while the rest (80%) were left crumbling over just a few measly crumbs.



As some students basked in the chocolatey bliss of their Oreo wealth, it was a sobering reminder that such indecencies impact real people every day. The very cookies we consumed are made by Mondelez's Nabisco division - a company known for exploiting workers, using child labor, and under-



paying the powerless.

There some students sat, elite "cookie capitalists" indulging in the fruits of economic injustice. While some stuffed their faces, other students realized that around the world many cannot afford a single Oreo.

For the cookie "have-nots," it was a harsh glimpse into what life is like for the world's poor. As the crumbs rapidly depleted, students got a sense of the powerlessness experienced in underdeveloped nations. Suddenly, the playing field didn't feel so level.

Cries for justice and equality rang out as the have-nots tried all tactics imaginable. Some demanded wealth redistribution (and cookies) from their rich classmates. Others tried stealing treats, offering to trade, or cozying up to the elite for protection.

Students gained a deeper understanding of natural resource - intensive production, the debt burden, population growth and child labour and breaking the vicious cycles of poverty. Lastly, students ended the course by looking beyond GDP per capita looking at measures of happiness and well-being.

Learning Beyond the Class

PLP 11 & 12 - Symposium on the Holocaust

On June 4, PLP 11 and 12 learners attended the 46th annual Symposium on the Holocaust at UBC. Both grades had just completed Holocaust-centered projects and were fortunate to have the opportunity to deepen their learning with Professor Emeritus of History, Chris Friedrichs and Historian Dr. Lauren Faulkner Rossi; Holocaust Survivor and Author Mariette Doduck; and filmmaker Dan Schubert, who shared his National Film Board of Canada documentary *Martha*, a moving tribute to his grandmother, also a survivor. During the Q&A panels, a PLP 11 student asked what young people could do to counter the rise in antisemitism as well as intolerance in general. The panelists advised students to educate themselves, and to do so from multiple sources, and to speak up when they witness acts of intolerance. As survivor and Noble Peace Prize winner Elie Wiesel said, "The opposite of love is not hate, it's indifference."

"One of the points from the lecture that was memorable to me was, 'Genocide happens because people believe and were taught to believe that they are superior to other people because of ethnicity and religious reasons. They hate Jews not because the Jews harmed them but because they belong to the other group.'"

"I found the videos and slideshow of how family members died very impactful as they gave us faces to go with the horrific historical information."

"From Dr. Faulkner Rossi: 'When you see something wrong happening, say something.'" "It was immensely impactful to be able to hear the story of a survivor in-person, especially since we will be one of the last generations able to."

"I found the documentary created by the grandson of a Holocaust survivor very impactful as it showed us a sweet, funny grandmotherly woman who had lived through such horrible experiences and it was heartbreaking to see her learn some even darker truths about her relatives."

"The symposium was very enlightening. Being able to hear this story, in person, serves as a grim reminder that the Holocaust wasn't just an event in our past, but rather, something that lives on with its survivors and their families."


