Cell Phone Use in the Classroom

Students are instructed to store their cellphones (personal digital devices) at home, in their lockers, or either in their bags or in the designated pouches during class. If a student needs to leave the classroom during class time, they must ensure their phone remains in the classroom. Phones maybe used during break and lunchtime only.

Seycove has taken deliberate steps this year to promote responsible technology use, enhance concentration, and foster well-being. This includes our collective endeavour to regulate smartphone usage in class.

Like any behavior change initiative, we've encountered both successes and challenges. During grade assemblies and in classrooms, our staff have stressed the significance of keeping cellphones out of sight, unless a teacher has granted explicit permission or if they are being used as an educational tool. This is a joint effort aimed at refining student focus, fostering better learning outcomes, and supporting mental health through clearly defined boundaries and positive examples.

We kindly request that you reinforce this message at home as we close this academic year and prepare for the next. For further guidance, BC Children's Hospital offers a valuable resource for families. It serves as a starting point for discussions about the NVSD cellphone policy and a family's approach to safe and responsible technology use. 

PLP 8 - Oregon Field Study

The PLP 8 Cohort has returned from their year end field study down the Oregon Coast! The cohort is currently studying advertising, design, and the idea of "adventure", and what an adventure it was! Equipped with their driving question: How does language inspire adventure?, learners visited many different venues while exploring the concept of adventure. From the Evergreen Aviation and Space Museum, the Hatfield Marine Science Centre, a Marine Discovery Boat Tour, and the treacherous mouth of the Columbia River!

PLP Adventure Tales: The Helping Hands of Warrenton, Oregon

Since 2014, barring the COVID-19 pause, PLP has committed time and effort for providing the fantastic learning experience of spending almost a full week on the Oregon Coast with all the PLP 8 learners on a field study: working with some of our field partners (like Oregon State University), exploring in the field (like the tide pools at Yaquina Head), and having fun (like zip lining with High Life Adventures).

In late May of 2023, we set off for what we expected to be our usual Oregon fantastic experience, in the trusty PAC bought and supported Seycove bus, with our amazing teacher/tour director/driver Bryan Hughes at the wheel. Little did we know how adventurous this particular field study would become for last year's group of PLP 8 learners and us!



Just before we pulled into our first night's resting stop, the Astoria KOA, the bus ground to a shuddering halt. Ms. Willemse, Mr. Hughes, and a bus full of PLP 8 learners and gear were stranded on the side of the road with very little around us and about 5 km left to go.

As the chaperones left the bus and began to come to terms with the situation, a car pulled over. It turns out we could not have picked a better moment or place to break down. Out of the car came John, a resident of Warrenton and employee of Astoria Ford. Not only did John have experience with rescues from his time as a member of Search and Rescue, he also had all the equipment in his car to help tow us and the contacts for a local tow truck.

In a short amount of time, with John steering the bus, we were all towed up the road to the Astoria KOA. They welcomed us by helping unload the bus and shuttling us on golf carts to our KOA Kabins for the night. The next day, as Ms. Willemse and the learners walked to Fort Stevens for our scheduled ranger tour and lunch, Mr. Hughes arranged a U-Haul rental for all the gear, while at home, Ms. McWilliam and Ms. Best found a rental bus.

There remained only one issue: how would the marooned learners make it all the way across town from the KOA to our zip line appointment in the afternoon with Highlife Adventures?

Cue our next set of helpers! When Mr. Hughes called High Life Adventures to share our issue, Katie Rummell, High Life Adventures' General Manager, wasted no time in appealing to the Warrenton/Astoria community for help via Facebook. The next thing we know, Scott and Cindy Birdwell, from Astoria Ford (completely unaware that it was their own employee John who had helped us from the roadside the night before) showed up in a limo and their personal vehicle to shuttle us to High Life Adventures (and home after!).

By the time Ms. McWilliam and Ms. Kadi arrived in the rental van and Seycove van the next morning, we were right back on schedule and finished the whole field study with the same learning and fun PLP has had in Oregon for 10 years now. Sadly, although Astoria Ford did a complete repair on the bus (and Mr. Hughes went back in the summer to transport it!), a further issue in the fall of 2023 led to the beloved Seycove bus failing inspection. However, that did not deter this year's PLP 8 Oregon field study!

As this year's PLP 8 learners prepared to leave last week, we knew we could not go to Oregon again without sending some Canadian thank you's to the Warrenton friends

French 11 Students: 123, on y va, on y va!



Grade 12 student, Sophia Leas, recently attended the Yukon First Nations Graduation in Whitehorse. Sophia joined fellow Indigenous students from across the Yukon to celebrate their graduation from high school. Some of the Indigenous communities represented included the Selkirk, Kwanlin Dün ,Kluane and Tlingit First Nations.

Sophia's Indigenous ancestry is very important to her; her mother is Dakota Cree and Kahkewistahaw from Saskatchewan, and her father is Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in from Dawson City, Yukon. "Being part of the graduation ceremony in the Yukon made me feel more connected to my culture," says Sophia, "it was nice to see all of my friends and family from my community." An added highlight from her trip was getting to view some of the abundant Yukon wildlife which included bear and caribou sightings.

For the ceremony, Sophia wore a traditional Indigenous dress made of deer hide and intricate beaded artwork, which was made for her by a family friend. Sophia's outstanding academic achievements were recognized at the ceremony where she received the "Venturous Award" for academic excellence. Congratulations, Sophia!


Emmett Barry - European Baseball Championship

King of the Mountain - Keaton S


