

SCIENCES HUMAINES 9: COURSE OUTLINE

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Bienvenue aux Sciences Humaines 9!

This semester, we will continue your journey for understanding History and Humanities. Together, we will explore several topics related to the periods between the 1750 and 1914. Our big ideas are as follows:

- I. Emerging ideas and ideologies profoundly influence societies and events;
- II. The physical environment influences the nature of political, social and economic change;
- III. Power imbalances alter relations between individuals and between societies;
- IV. Collective identity is constructed and can change over time;
- V. Colonialism and its impact on the First Nations of Canada and the world.

CURRICULUM

This course was developed to meet the learning outcomes of <u>BC's curriculum</u>, prescribed by the British Columbia Ministry of Education.

ASSESSMENT:

Assessment will be regular and cumulative. You will complete various tasks to demonstrate your understanding of what we've studied in class (knowledge tests, projects, self-assessment, etc.). The scale used is the one approved by the Ministry of Education. More information can be found here in English and in

Extending: The student can apply what they have learned in new, different and sophisticated ways.

Proficient: The student demonstrates a full understanding of the skills and concepts associated with learning.

Developing: The student demonstrates a partial understanding of the skills and concepts associated with learning, but still needs to work on other aspects of the domain.

Emerging: The student demonstrates an initial understanding of the skills and concepts associated with the expected learning. The student continues to learn, but may need more support to move forward.

EXPECTATIONS

A. IN THE CLASSROOM:

E. PLAGIARISM AND CHEATING

- The use of translators is strictly prohibited on assignments handed in for marks. Using Google Translate to translate full sentences is considered plagiarism. It is considered a robot's work, not yours. This includes Deepl, ChatGPT or any other AI.
- Students are to use dictionaries, or sites such as Linguee, and other tools for individual words or expressions, not for sentences or paragraphs.
- Plagiarism and cheating will result in a mark of zero (0), and a mention will be made on the student's transcript.
