Bienvenue aux Sciences Humaines 10!

This semester, we will continue your journey for understanding History and Humanities.

Together, we will explore several topics between 1914 and today. Our main goals are as follows:

- I. To determine what is significant in an account, narrative, map, and text;
- II. To accumulate knowledge that enables you to understand the causes and consequences of important events;
- III. Learn to critically analyze primary and secondary sources and assess their credibility;
- IV. Make informed judgments about the past and draw parallels with the present;
- V. Explain different perspectives on past or present people, places, issues, and events, and compare the values, world-views and beliefs of human cultures and societies in different times and places;
- VI. Make ethical judgements about past events, decisions, and actions, and assess the limitations of drawing direct lessons from the past.

CURRICULUM

This course was developed to meet the learning outcomes of <u>BC's curriculum</u>, prescribed by the British Columbia Ministry of Education.

THE BIG IDEAS

The Big Ideas consist of generalizations, principles and key concepts important to Social Studies. They represent what students will understand at the completion of the curriculum for their grade. Embedded within the course content, they are intended to endure beyond a single grade and contribute to future understanding.

Global and regional conflicts have been a powerful force in shaping our contemporary world and identities.

The development of political institutions is influenced by economic, social, ideological and geographic factors.

Worldviews lead to different perspectives and ideas about developments in Canadian societies. Historical and contemporary injustices challenge the narrative and identity of Canada as an inclusive, multicultural society.

ASSESSMENT:

Assessment will be regular and cumulative. You will complete various tasks to demonstrate your understanding of what we've studied in class (knowledge tests, projects, self-assessment, etc.).
