COMPARATIVE CULTURES 12

COURSE CONTENT:

The overall theme of Cult. 12 are **the "cultural texts" of Civilizations**. We will investigate this theme by studying the art, architecture, histories, mythologies, religions, and philosophies of selected civilizations throughout history including the Greco/Roman world, "Modern" Europe (Renaissance to present), and aspects of our current Civilization.

This course is meant to be wide ranging and broad in scope rather than having a narrow, specialized focus. As a result, course content may change depending on student interest and time constraints. The study of culture and civilization allows great leeway in our topics of study; anything from Botticelli to Batman can (and, in many cases, will) be studied in this course.

THE BIG IDEAS:

The Big Ideas consist of generalizations, principles and key concepts important to Cult 12. They represent what students will understand at the completion of the curriculum for their grade. Embedded within the course content, they are intended to endure beyond a single grade and contribute to future understanding.

Understanding the diversity and complexity of cultural expressions in one culture enhances our understanding of other cultures.

Interactions between belief systems, social organization, and languages influences artistic expressions of culture. Geographic and environmental factors influenced the development of agriculture, trade, and increasingly complex cultures.

Value systems and belief systems shape the structures of power and authority within a culture.

CURRICULAR COMPETENCIES:

Students are expected to be able to do the following:

- Use Social Studies inquiry processes and skills to: ask questions; gather, interpret, and analyze ideas; and communicate findings and decisions
- Assess and compare the significance of cultural expressions at particular times and places (significance)
- Evaluate inferences about the content, origins, purposes, context, reliability, and usefulness of multiple sources from the past and present (evidence)
- Analyze continuities and changes in diverse cultures at different times and places (continuity and change)
- Assess the development and impact of the thought, artistic expressions, power and authority, and technological adaptations of diverse cultures (cause and consequence)
- Explain different perspectives on past and present cultures (perspective)
- Make ethical judgments about actions in the past and present, and assess appropriate ways to remember and respond (ethical judgement)

COURSE CONTENT:

While the material of the course is flexible, the following headings should be used to organize your binder:

- I. Civilization and Culture
- II. Archaeology
- III. Mythology
- IV. the Ancient World
- V. the Renaissance
- VI. Project work and Ideas Through Culture (Miscellaneous stuff. . .)

STUDENT LEARNING: ACTIVITIES AND STRATEGIES:

You will participate in a variety of activities and produce a variety of work that will reflect your learning in this course.

This is a participation course and therefore your views are required on a daily basis. Furthermore, your opinions and ideas are respected and valid if expressed in a sincere manner.

The majority of the marks will be based on projects, assignments, and tests. We will have 2 major assignments this semester. **To be successful, these assignments require your honest and best efforts.** If you expect to expend anything less, then this is not the course for you.

ASSESSMENT AND EVALUATION:

The year has been divided into two semesters. Students will receive several formal reports including interims/incomplete forms. Marks throughout the semester will be calculated and reported as a cumulative mark. The following are the main assessment and evaluation strategies that may be used:

- Several Major assignments
- oral discussion and presentations
- formal exams and unit tests
- · quizzes, homework, in class assignments

CLASSROOM POLICIES AND PROCEDURES: Please Read Carefully

HATS OFF!: Please remove all hats/toques/hoodies/head gear before entering the class.

Electronics usage: Students are **not** to use personal electronic devices in class. **Please turn them off and put them away before class begins.
