COURSE OBJECTIVE EFP Literary Studies and Writing 11 is designed for students who are interested in studying First Peoples literature and using writing for self-expression and communication in a variety of contexts. [You will] delve deeply into First Peoples' oral and written literature in a range of media to explore various themes, authors, and topics. This provides a foundation for [you] to think critically and creatively as [you] continue to explore, extend, and strengthen [your] writing. [You will] work individually and collaboratively to explore oral and written literature and create powerful, purposeful compositions. Through the study of literature and the processes of experimenting with, reflecting on, extending, and refining [your] writing, [you will]:

- Extend [your] capacity to communicate effectively in a variety of contexts
- Deepen [your] understanding of [yourselves] and the world
- Expand [your] understanding of what it means to be an educated Canadian and global citizens

The general goal of this course will be to explore various aspects of indigenous cultures through the lens of story. Via assorted mediums you will establish a deeper understanding of the power of story and its significance to culture, history, and how we all interpret the world around us. We will look at how people have responded to and played with story, in both positive and negative ways, in addition to a few common cross-cultural tropes of story. The hope is for you to draw from your personal experiences in addition to what we discuss in class so that you might connect to the material authentically and personally through diverse forms of writing and creativity.
